Age limits for classifieds lifted

DOWNEY—The Board of the Downey Unified School District has waived a regulation that required classified personnel to submit a written request if they wished to continue employment with the School District beyond the age of 67.

The State Education Code was changed several years ago, and now states that no minimum or maximum age limits shall be established for employment or continued employment of persons as part of the classified service.

The action was part of the consent agenda at Tuesday's regular Board meeting.

In other action, the School Board:

* Approved an addendum to the contracts of the Superintendent, Assistant Superintendent for Instructional Services and Assistant Superintendent Personnel Services to extend contracts to June 30, 2008.

Hospital's Fuller denies DRMC to close Emergency

Says hospital studying options

DOWNEY—Dispelling fears that Downey Regional Medical Center's Emergency Room facility was among 3 Los Angeles County hospitals at risk of closing due to heavy financial burdens, as was reported recently in big, bold headlines in the dailies and on TV, DRMC executive vice-president Rob Fuller issued a statement Tuesday that said, "We are not closing our Emergency Room...We are committed to keeping this vital service open to our community."

It's true, DRMC is losing \$2 million a year, Fuller was quoted as saying earlier, but he stated, "We are studying our options to ease the issues we are facing in the ER, such as instituting a private ambulance service." He said that with 199 beds, DRMC accommodates over 50,000 ER patients annually, which is more than the number handled by Long Beach Memorial (with 600 beds) and almost as much as St. Francis (with 300 beds and a trauma center).

The ER crisis, he said, results from state and county policy choices over access and money: "The County has cut off access to medical care for many uninsured residents by closing its clinics (including five in towns surrounding Downey in October 2002), reducing its own hospital services, and eliminating the ability of private hospitals to transfer County patients to County facilities. These former County facility patients have migrated to private hospitals like Downey Regional, but there are no provisions for reimbursing private hospitals for their care."

He said that the current laws that give St. Francis Hospital over \$30 million a year in so-called 'disproportionate share' funds give Downey Regional nothing for providing care to the same segment of the population. The County has in essence transferred its responsibilities to private hospitals without any financial offset, he said.

Fuller's statements are contained in a letter he sent to Downey Councilmember Meredith Perkins, referring to the morning's newspaper reports about a possible domino effect affecting the county's'entire emergency medicine system. The other hospitals mentioned as "at risk" were


State flayed

Donald La Plante noted that the state finally produced a budget more than a month late, and he deplored the continued demands of state mandates. He pointed out that with school districts which vary in size from a dozen students to the huge Los Angeles Unified which has nearly 70,000 pupils, the State's legislators insist on enacting education bills with a "One size fits all" philosophy that simply do not work.

Ferraro on uniforms

The Board's Betty Ferraro told the panel she would introduce a new voluntary plan for school uniforms later in the school year for next year. Ferraro is a tireless advocate of uniforms, which she said were never given a proper chance to succeed here.

The Board unanimously voted to drop the existing uniform program later in the meeting.

The College Board announced July 20 it would appoint a board member to fill the seat left open by the sudden passing of Cheryl A. Epple on July 5, 2004. A total of 15 letters were received and considered by the Board.

City opts to lease ladder truck for Fire Department

DOWNEY—The City Council has opted to acquire a new \$831,258 fire ladder truck for the Downey Fire Department, voting 4-1 (with Councilman Meredith Perkins dissenting) for lease purchase terms to pay for it, rather than make a demand on the City General Fund. The action was at Tuesday's regular Council meeting.

The item was continued from the Aug. 10 agenda after Councilman Perkins questioned the use of lease purchase, saying the city might save money by outright purchase.

City staff came back and recommended lease purchase, saying that the amount was substantial enough to cover, in the words of Asst. City Manager Lee Powell, the "cost of paperwork" involved and meritorious enough for a lender to profit from such a deal.

A staff report earlier noted that the acquisition of a new fire ladder truck was already approved as part of the 2004-05 budget. Staff had already studied the acquisition and recommended a ladder truck from Pierce fire Apparatus. Advantages cited include: 1) fleet continuity; 2) quality of assembly; 3) driver/operator familiarization; 4) similar parts inventory; 5) similar maintenance procedures; and 6) convenience of a local service center.

An independent testing firm, Failsafe Testing, has found Pierce to be the highest quality. The truck has a full 20-year warranty.

Lease-purchase versus 100-percent cash purchase involves obtaining a loan versus the use of city capital. In the case of the clubhouse, the city obtained a loan for 4.75 percent over 25 years. In the case of the ladder truck, the preliminary interest rate appears to be 3.95 percent over 10 years. Based on this the staff recommended lease-purchase, to preserve the city's capital.



Good Samaritan and California Hospital, both located near downtown Los Angeles.

"We hope that County, State, and Federal officials will change the funding for emergency medicine to allow private hospitals to be reimbursed for services provided to uninsured patients who would otherwise be the County's responsibility," Fuller said.

Three main reasons were given in Tuesday's *Los Angeles Times* article for the ER crisis: one, the huge number of people in Southern California without health insurance; two, the costly earthquake retrofit requirements imposed on county hospitals after the 1994 Northridge earthquake; and, three, the mandated nurse-to-patient ratio that has seen hospital costs escalate, exacerbated by the acute nursing shortage in the state.

"Let me repeat that closure of our ER is not an option." Fuller concluded. "We are not shrinking from the issue; we are truing to innovate, trying to muster political leadership on the issue, and trying to effectuate changes that will allow all patients [regardless of ability to pay] to receive the care they need."

While the majority of donations are distributed locally, 20 percent will go to Buckner International, an orphan care group that collects resources for worldwide distribution.





Troubled Golden

More shooting occurred in the troubled neighborhood near Golden Park Friday, Aug. 20.

Once more police are left with few clues other than used shell casings and interviews with witnesses, many of whom may be loath to give details due to fear of retribution.

A previous shooting involved the exchange of gunshots in front of Golden three weeks ago when the occupants of a white van fired at individuals in front of the park and the latter produced guns and fired back as the van drove off. It was about 2 p.m. in the afternoon.

By the time police arrived all the suspects were gone.

These incidents of gang violence are particularly troublesome because of the danger to innocent children in the area.

The Downey Patriot has been in contact with residents who link the two shootings to one of the oldest gangs in the area, whose roots go back three generations. If this is true, it is a disgusting tradition of violence that cannot be tolerated any longer. We trust neighbors will come forward and tell what they know.

Only through vigilance and the cooperation of us all with police and such groups as Gangs Out Of Downey (GOOD) will we prevail against this resurgent gang threat.

Downey Cemetery niche wall nears completion

DOWNEY—A dedication ceremony is planned for Veteran's Day in November for a new Memorial Garden and Veterans' Wall at the historic Downey Cemetery.

The \$450,000 project includes landscaping and benches at the old cemetery located at Lakewood Boulevard and Gardendale which is overseen by a county-appointed Cemetery Board. Members of the Board are Diane Boggs, Gary McCaughan and Ken Beckler.

The Cemetery District includes most of Downey and parts of South Gate, Lakewood, and Bellflower.

Downey Community Services Director Bonnie Kehoe, who also serves as administrative director of the cemetery, said the new niche wall with some 487 niches for cremated remains, as well as a Veterans' Wall, have recently been completed.

Workers are currently awaiting a polished granite cover for the Veterans' wall, as well as travertine, polished brown stone which will be included in the niche wall.


Following the dedication ceremony, the niches will be sold, with cost varying depending on location in the wall.

Officials hope the income from the niches will provide operating revenue for the cemetery, which has run out of available space for grave sites underground.

Board Vice Chairman Ken Beckler said he has obtained a \$5,000 donation from area Disabled American Veterans to pay for engraving on the veterans wall including the names of more than 400 veterans buried at the cemetery.

The district has no employees, but contracts with the City for needed services.

The cost of \$450,000 is funded through several grants, some \$7,000 in private donations, and a loan of \$7,500 from the City (to be repaid by sale of the niches).

I want to thank Hugh T. Hoskins for recommending a website. My husband and I have recently questioned several areas in planning future cruise trips beyond our U.S. boundaries. Travel columns in other newspapers suggest you be cautious when traveling abroad, [because] there's always a risk no matter where you go.

We decided to check the Dawn Princess on the recommend website, us.cdc.cruisehealth.org. We learned that the Dawn Princess was inspected on June 24 this year and that points are deducted from a score of 100 for health violations. It was somewhat reassuring to read that this ship scored "95." A score of "95" didn't seem bad. Of course, "100" would have been better! In reading the actual detailed report of 2 violations that dealt with the buffet area, it gave us food for thought. One violation stated that the food trays or platters were too close to the sneeze guard. The recommendation was to move the trays or platters back further. The second violation noted that the serving spoons weren't long enough to stay upright against the serving dish. (Good point! If the short serving spoon is handled, then falls back into the food, there's a possible problem). We don't know the time frame that the CDC (Controlled Disease Center) gives the cruise lines to remedy their problems. But think about it. If you're on U.S. soil and you go to a buffet type restaurant, they encounter the same type of problem. So will we book a cruise? You bet! We're placing our trust in God and in Princess Cruises! We're carrying a positive attitude, loading up with bottles of hand sanitizer lotion, wearing gloves to handle the spoons or avoiding the buffet area. The buffet area is not the only eating area aboard ship. Happy cruising!

Self-Help Graphics works have been exhibited throughout the United States including the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, D.C.



Academic excellence

*Presented the Mayor's Academic Excellence Award to Oluwabukola Adeyinka, 2004 Downey High graduate, who plans to attend Loyola Marymount.

*Presented a City tile to Maria Larkin in honor of her service as Chamber of Commerce president from 2003-2004.

*Held a public hearing and then declared a resolution self-certifying Downey's conformance with L.A. County Metropolitan Transportation Authority's 2004 Congestion Management Program.

*Held a public hearing to receive public comment on the city's Draft Natural Hazard Mitigation Plan.

Rail crossing

*Approved a cash contract as part of the Lakewood Boulevard Improvement Project for Phase 1B, Union Pacific Railroad Agreements, and adopted a resolution authorizing public road crossing improvements and pipeline crossing agreements for work within the railroad right-ofway. Total cost of the two agreements is \$181,000, to come from the Capital Improvement Budget.

*Approved community development subrecipient agreements with ARC, the Children's Dental health Clinic, DUSD, Rio Hondo Temporary Home, Southern California Rehab Services, the Salvation Army Southeast Communities Corp., Su Casa, and the development of a contract with the Fair Housing Foundation of Long Beach.

*Approved the application for pedestrian funds for 2004-5 under the Transportation and Development Act.

City employees

*Adopted a resolution approving a memorandum of understanding between Downey and the City Employees' Association.

*Adopted a resolution for a code amendment on small and large family day care homes in residential areas.

*Proposed an amendment on speed limits for Clark Avenue and Studebaker road. The speed limit on Clark between Lakewood Boulevard and Foster road will be reduced by 5 mph to 30, but Studebaker Road between Florence and Cecilia will be unchanged at 40 mph.

Councilman Perkins extended an invitation to all to the opening tomorrow, Aug. 28 of the new Rio hondo Clubhouse. There will be an Open House from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. He especially thanked 3 people who served in his subcommittee, saying they can't be thanked enough for their valuable contributions to the realization of the new clubhouse that will serve the community "for many, many years": fellow Councilman Rick Trejo, Community Services Director bonnie Kehoe, and "behind-the-scenes guy," Asst. City Manager Lee Powell.

Lennie Whittington, in Oral Communications, voiced concern about the possible ER closures as reported by the media, before Perkins read key passeges from DRMC executive vice-president Rob Fuller's letter to him, assuring everyone that DRMC is committed to "no ER closure." Whittington also asked Police chief John Finch to commend "a certain police officer" (whose name he didn't get) who was responsible for mitigating a "loud music" situation that threatened the peace of his neighborhood recently.

Councilman Rick Trejo warned of a potentially "big parking issue" involving the Brookhurst and Davis Streets area, and suggested that a traffic study/analysis be made on it.





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
