Keep Downey Beautiful to be honored in D.C.

DOWNEY—Keep Downey Beautiful will receive a Keep America Beautiful President's Circle Award Thursday, Dec. 2 at the inaugural President's Circle Luncheon in Washington, D.C. during Keep America Beautiful's 51st Anniversary National Conference. The award has been introduced this year to recognize exemplary effort made by affiliates in Keep America Beautiful's Network of Affiliates to reduce litter, minimize waste, and beautify and improve their local communities.

In qualifying for a President's Circle Award, Keep Downey Beautiful has met Keep America Beautiful's standards of excellence by conducing an annual Litter Index, calculating the affiliate's cost/benefit ratio, and engaging volunteers to take greater responsibility for their community environment. In addition, award recipients must conduct activities in Keep America Beautiful's 3 core focus areas of litter prevention, waste reduction, and beautification/community improvement.

Downey youngster handles show dog

NEW YORK—There will be a lot of tail wagging, heart pounding action when Cassidy Jackson of Downey and junior handlers from around the country compete with their dogs during the AKC/Eukanuba National Championship in Tampa, Fla., Jan. 15-16.

Cassidy and other junior handlers between 10 and 18 years of age will contend for top honors and scholarship dollars. Four scholarships will be awarded to junior handlers during the National Championship: first place winner will receive \$2,000, with \$1,500, \$1,200 and \$1,000 to second, third and fourth place respectively.

AKC/Eukanuba National

The AKC/Eukanuba National Championship remains the first and only national dog show of its kind. A conformation dog show, the event features competition among America's top 20 show dogs from every AKC-recognized breed. Cassidy is one of about 100 junior handlers from throughout the U.S. who will compete in this exclusive, invitation only event.

The junior handler competition is judged on the handler's ability to present the dog capably and with confidence. Eligibility to enter is based on the junior's accomplishments in both the show ring and the classroom. For the first time ever, the AKC/Eukanuba Championships will be televised live. The event will appear on Animal Planet and the Discovery Channel Jan. 15-16 starting at 8 p.m. ET both nights.

More than \$80,000 raised





City expected to OK learning core grant

DOWNEY—A 21st Century Community Learning Center Core Grant of \$178,880 has been approved by the California Department of Education and was expected to be accepted by the City Council at Tuesday's regular meeting.

The Council was also expected to execute an agreement with Global Learning Inc., for services linked to the local grant-funded after-school programs.

The City and Downey Unified Schools received notice on Oct. 28 that the grant application for two new after school sites had been approved.

Federal money

The 21st Century Community Learning Centers Grant is authorized by Title IV, Part B of the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001 (federal money), administered by the California Department of Education After School Partnership Office.

The new grant funds are for operation and administration of after school programs at Gauldin and Alameda Schools modeled after the four ASPIRE school sites currently operating at Carpenter, Ward, Sussman and West schools. The grant period is July 1, 2004 through June 30, 2006.

The State Department of Education requires that all grant-funded after school programs be evaluated on an annual basis. In Nov., 2003, the City Council approved an agreement with Global Learning, Inc., to formally evaluate the ASPIRE program for fiscal year-2003-04. The company successfully met the terms of that agreement which ended Nov. 12, 2004.

Section 1, Term of Agreement, provides an option to extend the period for an additional year. The attached agreement authorizes an additional year and calls for the two new school sites. Compensation is to be paid Global upon significant milestones in evaluation, not to exceed \$15,624. There is no additional financial impact to the City.

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We still get calls

What do newspersons do?

Well, just about everything in an average week used to come across this editor's desk. Of course, since we added the title of "publisher" we aren't available for as many phone calls as in the past. But we recall those old days fondly.

One week was highlighted by a woman who called to tell us that a large "unidentified" white bird like none she had ever seen before was in her block of Downey. What did she want us to do? She was not sure. Perhaps come out and confirm that we had never seen a bird quite like this one either. Maybe take a picture of it. That would be nice.

Use your imagination. Newsman arrested in backyard with camera...claims he was investigating strange white bird!

The same week a woman came in and assured us that the post office was not delivering mail but instead had a big truck they were throwing letters into: (hers and her friend's). Why hadn't anyone else noticed this? Don't argue. She'll even show you the truck!

Take note here that the editor is not a specialist in either strange birds, or the U.S. Postal Service. If you can't identify the bird, it is a good bet that neither can the editor.

But lest we protest too much, let's consider Walter Lippman, one of America's most revered columnists and the author of "The Public Philosophy." Lippman spoke 54 years ago before a group of Iowa editors and publishers on the 100th birthday of the Des Moines Register and Tribune.

Lippman told them, "There is, I believe a fundamental reason why the American press is strong enough to remain free. That reason is that American newspapers, large and small, and without exception belong to a town, a city at the most to a region." He said the secret of a truly free press is "that it should consist of many newspapers decentralized in their ownership and their management, and dependent for their support...upon communities where they are written, where they are edited, and where they are read." When Lippman spoke, 1,300 American newspapers—-almost all of them independent and locally owned-existed. Today thanks to mergers and financial times, there are less than 300.

The Downey Patriot is an independent and locally owned, hometown newspaper that thrives on local coverage. So keep on calling and writing us with your strange birds and suspicious mail trucks. We'll try and listen, even if we don't know your bird's name...

CSULB study reveals economic growth

DOWNEY - Economic experts presented a cautiously optimistic outlook for strengthening economic growth in Southern California, including Downey, at last week's Eighth Annual Regional Economic Forecast Conference, sponsored by the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG) and done in conjunction with California State University, Long Beach.

Over 100 local elected officials and staff, public agencies, private sector executives and academics attended the SCAG conference held at the Walt Disney Concert Hall in Los Angeles. The forecasts, compiled by SCAG in partnership with CSULB and California State University, Fullerton, are the only projections to focus exclusively on the short-term economic outlook (2005-06) for the entire southern California region (Imperial, Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside, San Bernardino and Ventura

According to the CSULB forecast, overall regional growth through August was 0.7 percent, putting Southern California slightly behind the state's growth rate, but still an improvement over last year's 0.2 percent.

The region generated 102,000 new jobs, but also lost 46,000 jobs, with nearly 30,000 of those losses occurring in the manufacturing sector. The information, high-tech and state and local government sectors also saw job losses, while the professional, business and tourism service sectors saw

With the ports of Los Angeles and Long Beach handling more than one-third of the nation's cargo container traffic, the trade and transportation sectors posted some of the region's strongest job gains this past year.

"Trade and commerce will play an increasingly important role in the region's economic health," said Ron Roberts, SCAG President and Temecula city councilmember. Added SCAG Executive Director Mark Pisano: "Entrepreneurial approaches to the trade and logistics industry, rather than traditional public works approaches, will be pivotal in driving the region's next 'gold rush.' However, if we don't make some critical investments in our goods movement infrastructure, we will seriously jeopardize Southern California" position in the future global marketplace."

By 2005, the CSULB forecast projects regional job growth at slightly more than 2 percent, lagging behind the annual gains made in the late 1990s but stronger than the lackluster growth of recent years.

Mullen, who has trained numerous national winning Andalusian and Arabian horses," adds: "There is such a need for handicapped riding programs that are operated by instructors that are very experienced in horse training and handling. Safety is paramount with these riders." Some lessons require as many as 3 instructors to provide the necessary degree of safety.

Over the years, Mullen has coached students with ADD, hyperactivity, mental retardation, Down's Syndrome, blindness, and amputations. He says, "The riding gives the students a reason to focus, and a real sense of pride and achievement. The bond that takes place between the horse and student is extremely special. Lessons include physical and mental exercises, as well as activities that often include specific material that is taught in the student's school. Some time is spent on the ground grooming and caring for the horses. We even have a miniature horse that is great for grooming, and that can pull a cart. The students love driving in the cart."

Mullen is a certified instructor with the National Association of Handicapped Riders. He says further, "Handicapped individuals can be considered angels in disguise, who are here to make the world a better place, with every right to enjoy and benefit from the magnificent equine. Thus we named our program for "mounting" these individuals, Angel Mountin'.'

The Getty celebrating the snapshot




Golf tourney helps Boys & Girls Clubs

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
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Warren band receives big financial boost
