### Mayor: All quiet on the Downey Studios front

 Mayor raises concerns over lack of filming at Downey Studios.

**DOWNEY**—In Tuesday's regular City Council meeting, Mayor Meredith Perkins noted that "There seems to be nothing going on at the Downey Studios nowadays," certainly as far as making movies is concerned—not like in previous months when its sound stages were visibly humming with film-related activity.

"I think it is headed in another direction," he said, in subsequent remarks. "And I wish I knew what that direction is."

The mayor said a meeting circa last January-February was arranged between him and two of the principal owners for a possible explanatory session, but only one showed up, and nothing specific or revelatory was discussed.

Perkins voiced concerns that the uncertainty or lack of specificity about the studios' plans, at least at this point in time, could have a deleterious impact—economic or otherwise—on the city.

In other action, the Council:

•After a public hearing, approved the assessment of a lien to recover

### Kaiser scores high on HMO report card

For the sixth year in a row, Kaiser Permanente received the most stars in the HMO Quality Report from the California Office of the Patient Advocate (OPA). Kaiser Permanente's Southern California Region and Northern California Region were the only two health plans to earn six stars of a possible eight in the overall ratings of the just released 2006 OPA Healthcare Quality Report Card.

The two Kaiser Permanente regions also led the way in clinical quality. The Northern California Region scored 26 of a possible 32 stars, followed closely by Southern California with 24 stars—the only two health plans to earn 20 stars or more in the eight clinical measures cited by the OPA.

For example, Kaiser Permanente's Southern California Region was top rated for breast cancer screening—providing mammograms to 84 percent of its female members between the ages of 52 and 69. "This is an example of what our dedicated physicians and other members of the health care team can do to improve health," said Jeffrey Weisz, M.D., executive medical director and chairman of the board of the Southern California Permanente Medical Group. "We've focused our efforts on reaching out to women by phone, through the mail and in person to remind them that it is time to have a mammogram. We're confident that we're saving lives."

### Hospital does well in medical staff survey

**Downey Regional Medical Center** DOWNEY—Downey Regional Medical Center received gratifying results in a survey of its medical staff perceptions of the hospital. This baseline survey conducted by NRC-Picker as part of the hospital's ongoing "Total Quality Management" (TQM) quality improvement initiative showed overwhelming support for Downey Regional. Compared to the average level of medical staff approval of their hospitals across the country of around 70 percent, Downey Regional's overall approval rating exceeded 83 percent-a very positive initial level of support. "The survey is a rich source of data for our TQM process which we will use to engage the physicians in programs to make the hospital better," commented COO Rob Fuller. "While there are areas for improvement, and lots of work ahead of us, it is exciting to see that our starting point is so positive," stated Fuller. Areas that the hospital's physician staff see as strong include the quality improvement programs, collaboration among nurses and doctors, Radiology, the Emergency Room, the Cath Lab, and overall quality and satisfaction with nursing. The survey of the medical staff is one of the three major survey sets that are being compiled to assist in the TQM process. The physicians will be surveyed annually; patients are surveyed monthly and employees will be surveyed at least annually. The first employee survey is set to go out in a few weeks. The surveys all request the 'customers' opinions about the quality of services at the hospital, and delve into very specific issues about communications, education, customer service, emotional support, cleanliness of the facility, timeliness of service, and a myriad of other matters all relating to hospital operations. The survey results are tabulated and shared with department managers and employees who are members of one or more of the various TQM councils. Each council is given a mission to analyze operations in a particular area in light of the survey data.

# The Downey Patriot sold to familiar face

 Jennifer DeKay-Givens, former Miss Downey Princess, takes over as owner/publisher.

**DOWNEY** – Four and a half years after The Downey Patriot published its first edition, the local community newspaper has been sold.

Effective Oct. 1, The Downey Patriot will be owned and published by Jennifer DeKay-Givens, a local product who graduated from Downey High School and even served as a princess on the Miss Downey Court. DeKay-Givens served as the Patriot's business manager since the paper's inception.

"The paper will meet the same standards that had been set since our first edition in 2002," said DeKay-Givens, who earned a degree in Communications from Cal State Fullerton. "Our paper has steadily improved through the years and I want to continue that improvement for the community."

Current owner and publisher, John Adams, will remain on staff as Editor Emeritus, DeKay-Givens said.

"From the moment I knew that Jennifer was interested in buying the paper, all the other potential buyers were ruled out," said Adams, a newspaper veteran since his days at the San Francisco Chronicle. "She's a product of the Downey Unified School District education and is keenly in touch with the community.

"She can carry on the Patriot."

The Patriot staff will remain largely intact, with no layoffs planned, DeKay-Givens said. Eric Pierce has been promoted to City Editor while Henry Veneracion will handle feature and human interest stories.

Jerry Brady, the Patriot's longtime advertising director, retired this week. DeKay-Givens will assume his duties.

Adams started The Downey Patriot in 2002 after the Downey Eagle, where he served as editor, ceased operations. The Patriot was similar in style and design to the Eagle, even employing the same distributing and printing companies.

Incidentally, DeKay-Givens played softball as a child with Tanya Andrews, daughter of Jerry Andrews, publisher of the Downey Eagle.

The Patriot set up their first office inside a dusty old locker room on the campus of Downey Adult School; two years later, they made the move to a more professional office building adjacent to the Downey YMCA, where they still reside to this day.

DeKay-Givens was raised in Downey, attending Good Shepherd Lutheran School, East Middle School and Downey High School. She was a princess on the Miss Downey Court from 1990-92.

In other clinical quality areas, Kaiser Permanente's Southern California Region was top rated in three of five measures for diabetic

# Kaiser facility one step closer to reality

• Final steel beam is lowered on new medical complex still two years away.

**DOWNEY** – The Kaiser Permanente Downey Medical Center on Imperial Highway, still more than two years away from completion, reached an important milestone this week.

The final six-ton steel beam was lowered onto the 657,047 square-foot hospital tower Wednesday. McCarthy Building Companies dropped the last remaining beam.

"We are excited to reach this phase of the construction project," Martin Gilbert, M.D., area medical director for Kaiser Permanente Bellflower Medical Center, said. "Our Kaiser Permanente Bellflower Medical Center has done an outstanding job serving the needs of our patients. However, stricter earthquake standards combined with a growing patient population and continuing advances in medical science require us to build a new medical center that will meet the future health needs of our patients."

The hospital, scheduled to open winter 2008-09, will include a new full-service inpatient facility with 352 beds, emergency department, and 82 departments with subspecialty services, including cardiology, neurology, nuclear medicine, oncology, surgery and surgical urgent care, among others.



### Contributions sought for city's recycling calendar

Art contest for students emphasizes oil recycling and its positive effects.

DOWNEY-Fundraising for the city of Downey's 2007 Used Oil Recycling School Calendar Artwork Contest has begun. The annual event includes Used Oil Recycling presentations to 5th grade students, who are encouraged to enter the competition.

In addition to receiving prizes, winners will have their artwork featured in the calendar.

The calendar contest is co-sponsored by the California Integrated Waste Management Board (CIWMB), whose funds pay for calendar development and publication (about 99 percent of the calendar cost). The balance of funds comes from sundry contributors, to defray the cost of awards and prizes.

According to Kathy Simmons, Integrated Waste Coordinator for the city, the calendar is "one of the most effective means to raise awareness among our school youth and adults about the problems of used oil dumping within our city. Do-It-Yourselfers across the nation dump more than 200 million gallons of used oil into the trash, into storm drains, and into backyards, where it can migrate to fresh water and ocean water sources. A single gallon of used oil can pollute a million gallons of water."

To help address the problem, the city of Downey, with the aid of CIWMB, has set up a network of collection centers for the safe collection and recycling of used oil.

The city's Used Oil Recycling School Calendar is distributed throughout the city as well as to the staff and students at the schools. The calendar sends a strong message that, in Simmons' words, "our environment is worth preserving."



A: The Downey Patriots relationship with the community will continue to become stronger.


Q: Has your family been supportive of your new responsiblities?

Her first job was as a clerk at Penguin Frozen Yogurt on Lakewood Blvd. and Gallatin Ave.



### Dropout dilemma

Despite countless and continuing efforts to remedy the problem, the California school system has not found a way to reduce the high rate of dropouts.

Surveys show that the dropout rate today is 30 percent state-wide. That's about the same as it was in the 1970s when educational reforms were instituted.

And 30 percent is an across the board figure for districts throughout California. What's more, things are even bleaker when groups such as African American and Latinos indicate dropout rates of up to 50 percent.

Studies indicate the added seriousness of dropout rates. The failure to graduate from high school results in an average reduction in lifetime earnings to just 65 percent of what one would expect if he or she stayed and got their diploma.

Also to be considered are the hard societal facts that we are continually being warned of the globalization of workplace and movement of jobs overseas. The Internet allows this globalization of jobs when international competition for work becomes more a question of any job at all, rather than salaries. In the Downey Unified School District, Darrell Jackson and his 10-20 Club work to turn at-risk youths back into the system so they have a second chance. He and the club are funded jointly by the school district and the City of Downey.

But there is nothing like the club on the state level. Legislators must stop trying to sweep the high dropout rate under the rug, and take real action.

### **Residents band against** eminent domain threat


The Downey Redevelopment Project Area Committee, a citizen advisory panel, will meet at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday in the Cormack Room of the Downey City Library. The public is invited to attend.

If you live, run a business, or otherwise own property in what is known as the Redevelopment Project Area, the property you rely on is vulnerable. The City of Downey long ago declared your property to be blighted and can now seize it any time under the power of eminent domain, forcing you to find a new home or to relocate your business. Think of how this would affect you.

Traditionally, the government only invoked eminent domain to secure public infrastructure - to lay roads, construct power plants, and establish schools. Howerver, you may have heard of a recent Supreme Court case, Kelo vs. City of New London, in which the majority upheld that eminent domain's practice could be expanded to include economic development.

This means that the City can seize blighted property (like your home or business) and transfer it to another private owner for the purposes of economic improvement and increased tax revenues. For example: tearing down your home to build a larger one, or closing your business to move in a larger competitor. Take note of the subjective nature of this arrangement: "blight" and "improvement" are matters of opinion. Your property may be attractive and clean, but it is legally regarded as blighted.

With the wide latitude of "economic improvement," eminent domain



must be from the Project Area but need not be property owners; renters are equally affected and welcome. If you are considering membership in the PAC, you can be comforted that it is a light commitment. We meet only once a month for 1 to 1 1/2 hours, but that has been enough to keep eminent domain out of Downey for almost 20 years. But you must attend this meeting to join.

Please come, even if you are unsure about joining - the PAC membership and your fellow citizens still seek your opinion as an affected, interested party in the Project Area, and it is possible to observe our meetings and join the committee at a later date. Concerned citizens from outside the Project Area are also welcome to attend and give input, although they cannot serve as members on the committee unless as a representative from another party.

could be exercised without limit, enabling myriad forms of abuse. Imagine the implications of a city whose government can take property from one private citizen and provide it to another: a city where developers can coerce property owners to sell well below market value; a city whose officials can enrich friends and business contacts; a city that amasses bigger budgets by preying on its citizens; a city that can dictate how much money its citizens should earn and how much wealth they should own.

So who is stopping this from happening? We are - the Downey Redevelopment PAC.

In 1987, the residents, business owners, and property owners in the Redevelopment Project Area negotiated with the City of Downey to remove eminent domain from the redevelopment plan. This was achieved through a California redevelopment law that provides for these individuals to form and maintain a Project Area Committee (PAC) as a guardian of their interests. The resulting body is not a City agency; it is composed entirely of citizens from the Project Area who answer only to their fellow constituents and to state law.

So long as we, the PAC, remain in existence, we can continue to fight against the threat of eminent domain while advising the City Council on the fair and proper course of redevelopment planning. But to do this, we need the support and membership of the community - you.

Every year, the PAC holds an Annual Meeting to elect new representatives from the Project Area. These members are selected from four categories to represent their respective interests: Homeowners, Tenants, Business Owners and Community Organizations.

We invite all interested citizens to attend this year's Annual Meeting on Tuesday, Oct. 3 at 6:30 p.m. in the Cormack Room of the Downey City Library and to take part in this election, either to voice your concerns, to learn more about redevelopment, or to apply for membership. Candidates

Most if not all of us that rely on Dial-A-Ride also greatly appreciate our drivers and tell them so. We appreciate their politeness, gentle stops, and safe driving.

The problems we are facing now are phone delays, protocol issues as stated earlier, and other recent changes in what was once a better operating service. I look forward to the improvement you can bring about now that these issues have been brought to your attention.



• Long Beach State will try to improve on last year's 16-16-1 record.

LONG BEACH - The Long Beach State 49ers open the 2006-07 ice hockey season tonight, Sept. 27, against the Arizona State University Sun Devils at the Glacial Garden Skating Arena in Lakewood.

Last season the 49ers swept all four games from the Sun Devils, taking two at home and two in Phoenix.

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



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
### Pushkin's life, work explored at festival



### Better get auto insurance soon or else, warns DMV

SACRAMENTO-Californians who operate their vehicles without auto insurance could have their vehicle registrations suspended effective Oct. 1 as part of new legislation designed to reduce the risk of economic losses sustained as the result of collisions involving uninsured motorists.

The legislation, signed in 2004 by Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger, requires the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) to notify a customer about possible vehicle registration suspension if their insurance company fails to provide proof of insurance within 30 days of a vehicle's initial registration with the department, or within 45 days once DMV has been notified by an insurance carrier about a policy cancellation.

"This new law is intended to protect Californians by reducing the number of uninsured vehicles on our roads," said Sunne Wright McPeak, Secretary of the Business, Transportation and Housing Agency during a news conference this week at the DMV South Sacramento Field Office. "Each year thousands of collisions occur involving uninsured vehicle owners." McPeak was joined by State Senator Jackie Speier, who authored the law, and George Valverde, Director of the state Department of Motor Vehicles.

"SB 1500 requires insurers to electronically transmit insurance verifications to the DMV and it directs the DMV to notify a vehicle owner if the vehicle is not insured," said Director Valverde. "Beginning Oct.1, we'll be in a position to identify vehicles that are uninsured and begin the process of notifying motorists of the need to get their vehicle insured."

Since July 1, 2006, law enforcement agencies have been able to electronically verify if any private-use vehicle is properly insured by accessing the department's vehicle registration database. DMV statistics show that there are more than 23 million licensed drivers in California who operate almost 30 million vehicles.

DMV statistics show that 1.4 million drivers have been convicted since 2001 for driving without proper insurance coverage.


For instance, it was recently noted that patients believed communications with them while they were inpatients were good. But our survey scores showed that there were a few other hospitals in the State with better scores. DRMC was above average, but had a ways to go to beat the best practices level in some of these areas.

Armed with that information that there is room for improvement, councils meet on a regular basis to 'brainstorm' how they can change what is done or how to do something in order to meet the patients' needs better. Research into best practices is done, and the councils evaluate the suggestions of the employees for change, prioritize them, and will ultimately formulate implementation plans.

Once the implementation plans are reviewed and approved by one of the oversight councils, the 'unit-based' councils will go forward and implement the changes suggested by the employees.

Results will then be analyzed in new surveys taken after the changes were implemented, compared to its prior scores and to State 'best practices' scores to see if improvements were made in meeting patients' (and physicians' and other employees') needs. This will be a continuous cycle of surveying customers, comparing results to best-practices, implementing changes, and re-surveying that comprises the TQM process.

"The purpose of the TQM process is to make the changes needed to better meet patients', physicians', and employees' needs," stated Fuller. "The result of TQM processes is that those organizations that truly enact the TQM process and focus on customer needs and make the changes necessary to meet those needs, will become the leading competitor in their fields. This has been proven over and over in the American economy, in everything from restaurants to major computer, television, and automobile companies."



### Cost of not closing can be very expensive

Everyone knows buying a home is expensive. But *not* buying a house can run into quite a few dollars as well. When the property deal falls through the price of bowing out of a home purchase can be high. A lot of little expenses and fees that homebuyers encounter on the path to closing still must be paid even if the deal falls through. Those expenses can add up to shockingly high amounts. Many of the expenses cannot be transferred to another purchase.

When buyers bid on homes, the offers they make come with the understanding that contingencies written into the contracts will be satisfied. A house must pass an inspection, for example, or a buyer's financing package must come through. If those things don't happen, the deal dies, but the expenses accrued do not go away.

#### What you'll still have to pay

**Inspection fees:** One of the prime reasons home sales break down is that inspections turn up unforeseen problems. Usually, a seller will try to accommodate a buyer in order to get the house sold, but sometimes the problems can't be negotiated away. The inspector's fee can run anywhere from about \$250 for a small job to \$1,000 or more for a big one, and is generally the responsibility of the buyer.

**Title search:** Generally speaking, title insurers undertake title searches and they often absorb the search cost if a home purchase is cancelled, according to Jim Maher, executive vice-president of the American Land Title Association. There can, however, be cancellation fees that the buyer has to pay. Whether these fees apply and how high they can run varies from state to state.

**Survey:** Surveys can find encroachments on the property or other problems that buyers may want to know about before they take possession. The property survey is often ordered by somebody else in the chain, usually the buyer's attorney or the lender, but it's the buyer who gets the bill. If any discrepancies that arise cannot be corrected or the deal falls apart for other reasons, the surveyor must still be paid. That can amount to \$500 to \$1,500, or more for really big jobs.

Attorney fees: Many real estate attorneys work on a flat rate and sometimes those fees can be applied to another home purchase, provided it is made within a designated time period, say a year. Other attorneys charge an hourly rate, which means any labor spent on a deal that fails still has to be paid for by the buyer. That can easily run into the hundreds of dollars. If there is any hassle about terminating the contract, the fees can quickly hit four figures.

**Appraisal fee:** Many lenders insist an independent property appraisal be done before they approve the final loan, according to Moulton. It may be to protect the lender but it's the buyer who pays for it, typically \$300 or so.


**Financing costs:** Application fees can usually be applied to another purchase but the delay can, in the current rising rate environment, cost buyers dearly, in added interest on their mortgages. Buyers locked into a low rate can buy an extension. It costs about a half percent of the amount of the loan for an extra 30 days.

**Document preparation fees:** Mortgage lenders and title companies charge these to put together all the papers they need to go forward with the loan.

#### Bottom line

Add it all up and the expense of canceling a home purchase can easily add up to several thousand dollars – and it's not even tax-deductible. There's no real solution to the costs associated with backing out of a deal. Making an offer on a home sends a big piece of machinery into motion and puts many different people to work. They have to be paid.

But buyers should calculate whether the costs of fixing whatever is wrong with the property adds up to a lot more money than it costs to back out of the deal – before they make the decision to walk away. *Cathleen Carr is the public relations director premierpropertyads.com*




