Perkins: 'I want to clear my name'

 Mayor defends himself against past allegations of wrongdoing in passionate address to city.

DOWNEY—In one of his last acts as mayor, and in a voice shaking with emotion, to-be-termed-out Mayor Meredith Perkins lashed out at "those who would sully my name" in connection with a matter that came to a boil more than a year ago, implicating him and two other members of the City Council with violation of the Brown Act.

Later naming names, Perkins mentioned Councilmember Anne Bayer, former Mayor Dianne Boggs, Atty. Joe Lumsdaine, and Lenny Wittington as initiating steps, at times, in the latter's case at least, "demanding and disruptive," to hold him and two other Councilmembers, Keith McCarthy and Kirk Cartozian, to task for possible violation of the Brown Act in relation to an ongoing (closed session) performance evaluation of the City Manager, Gerald Caton.

Perkins thundered that never in his life had his character been impugned, and that he was using Tuesday's meeting to "clear his character" of any hint of impropriety. He then dared anyone to show enough guts to come up to him and cast aspersions, vowing that he would emerge in the clear each time, as he "has nothing to hide."

Explaining later to this reporter why he was so upset at a situation that

Time Traveler Patton spent summer months in Downey

As allied and Iraqi armies maneuvered like pieces on a sandy chessboard two years ago, the desert tacticians on both sides probably didn't know the man they tried to copy, the greatest general of armored maneuver the world has ever known, grew up here in Downey.

George S. Patton, Jr., the "Blood and Guts" general who threw fear into the hearts of the Nazi war machine and outmaneuvered Erwin Rommel in World War II, summered in his youthful years here.

He even practiced generalship by marching young conscripts from the local sandlots up and down the dusty roads.

Thuy echoed those sentiments, "Today the clinic welcomes any volunteers who have the desire to help them with their work. I am going on this trip to help out people less fortunate than myself..."

The Maventibao clinic is a free clinic, operating entirely on donations and volunteers. Its founder, Ben Shipley, had to rebuild the clinic in 2003 when a tornado destroyed the entire town. Thuy said that they were proud to "share the Downey community-service spirit there" and hopes to return one day.

Olive Garden worker gets a taste of Italy

• Local employee spends week in Italy learning intricacies of fine wine and dining.

DOWNEY – For Christopher Paredes, a service assistant and certified trainer for the Oliver Garden restaurant in Downey, a recent trip to Italy was all in a day's work.

Paredes joined 23 other Olive Garden certified trainers who spent a week in Italy as part of the company's ongoing employee education and training initiative. Within Olive Garden, certified trainers are service leaders, responsible for training new team members in their restaurants and at newly opened locations throughout the U.S. and Canada.

In Italy, the group enjoyed the freshest foods and flavors of *trattorias* and *ristoranti*; toured some of the finest wineries and vineyards, went sightseeing in the cities of Rome, Florence, Siena, Trento, Verona and Milan; and experienced the hospitality of the country and its people.

"We spent time learning how to pair food and wine to create the most flavorful meals, and also that, in Italy, every meal is a warm and inviting celebration," said Pardes. "I look forward to sharing that same welcoming spirit and generosity withy my team and guests at Olive Garden."

During the trip, Paredes and the other certified trainers traveled to the Rocca delle Macie winery in Tuscany, one of Italy's leading producers of Tuscan wines, the Grezzana winery in Verona, and the Cavit winery in Trento, where they learned about Italy's illustrious history of winemaking. In between winery tours, Paredes spent time sightseeing and dining in some of Italy's most scenic cities.

The group also visited Olive Garden's Riserva di Fizzano restaurant, which has inspired many dishes on Olive Garden's menu, and the company's Culinary Institute of Tuscany, where more than 100 Olive Garden managers travel each year to learn the time-honored traditions of Italian cooking. Olive Garden operates 584 restaurants and employs over 70,000 workers with annual sales reaching \$2.6 billion, according to the company.

"could have been settled a long time ago," Perkins, again unable to suppress his anger at the parties concerned, said: "No one has had the courage to come up to me and say 'I'm sorry, we made a mistake.""

This, he said, after the matter had already been settled per following letter dated Aug. 26, 2005 from the District Attorney, Steve Cooley, which he read at Tuesday's meeting (Letterhead: Public Integrity Division, Bureau of Fraud and Corruption Prosecutions, of the Los Angeles County District Attorney's Office):

"Dear Mr. Perkins:

The Public Integrity Division (PID) has completed its review of the above referenced matter and has determined that there was insufficient evidence to conclude that a violation of the Brown Act occurred.

The Public Integrity Division received a request to conduct an investigation into whether three members of the Downey City Council, Kirk Cartozian, Keith McCarthy and yourself, violated the Brown Act by meeting together, or serially, in private to discuss the termination of City manger Gerald Caton. Following an investigation conducted by the District Attorney's Office Bureau of Investigation, Deputy District Attorney Anthony Colannino concluded that a review of the evidence did not sustain a finding that the Brown Act had been violated.

It was determined that, at most, only two council members met privately to discuss the city manager's performance. Since two council members constitutes less than a majority, and since there is no evidence of any prior or subsequent serial meeting, that meeting did not result in a violation of the Brown Act."

In other action, the Council:

•After a public hearing, adopted a resolution finding and determining the public interest and necessity for acquiring and authorizing condemnation of portions of real property located at 12623, 12631-12639 Lakewood Boulevard and 8818-8832 Imperial Highway; and at 12961 Lakewood Boulevard; and of the leasehold interest in the property located at 8850 Imperial Highway;

•Also after a public hearing, introduced an ordinance amending the city's comprehensive zoning map changing the zoning classification of the property at 11915 Downey Avenue from C-1 (Neighborhood Commercial) to R1-5,000 (Single-Family Residential) and approving zone change No. 06-132;

•Awarded contract for \$983,983 to All American Asphalt for Stewart and Gray road pavement rehabilitation;

•Approved the plans and specifications, and granted authority to advertise for bids for Imperial Highway raised medians between Bellflower Blvd. and Paramount Blvd.;

•Directed the City Attorney to draft a 10-year building lease extension between the city and the Downey Chamber of Commerce;

•Directed staff to process a Downey Municipal Code amendment to Article IX, Chapter I, Section 9136.16 (Christmas Tree sales), as it relates to duration of sales, and the addition of Halloween Pumpkin sales;

·Approved agreement with Novapro Risk Solutions for liability claims administration services;

•Approved professional services agreement with RMC Water and Environment for the development of a Sanitary Sewer Master Plan for the city in the amount of \$500,000; and appropriated \$100,000 from the General Fund for completion of the project;

•Approved amendment to the agreement with Gateway Cities Council of Governments - Phase 1 of the Truck Impacted Intersection Project; and appropriated \$51,260 from the Gas Tax Fund to support the activity;

•Approved agreement with Global Learning, Inc. for training services for the Aspire and Kid Smart Child Care programs;

•Approved agreement to purchase right-of-way easement at 8847 Imperial Highway and 12555 Lakewood Blvd. for a permanent roadway easement for Lakewood Blvd. improvements;

•Adopted a resolution establishing a salary range for Assistant nerintendent[.]

Wallace McKellar, a lifetime Downey resident, wrote down his early memories of the general. They are kept today in the Downey Historical Society office in Apollo Park.

"My family was very friendly with the family of General George S. Patton, Jr.," wrote McKellar.

He noted both his own and Patton's family were pioneers in the area. Patton's mother was the daughter of Don Benito Wilson for whom Mr. Wilson was named.

"George was not altogether a favorite with us kids, however. He was some 10 to 15 years older than we were and our annoyance of him began when he became a student at West Point. He was a born soldier and thought soldiering was great for kids. On his visits home from the Academy he would see a bunch of us playing sandlot baseball or something and right away he would recruit us into his army. He had an authoritative way about him and we didn't know how to refuse.

and that way in the hot sun. For 10-year-olds this was a lot of discipline we didn't appreciate at the time."

Little did the dusty children (probably all longing to go AWOL as young Patton drilled them) know they were being hounded by a budding military genius.

George Patton wasn't even the first of his line to gain fame locally. His father, George, Sr., was a well-known district attorney in Los Angeles and established the Patton Ranch on the San Gabriel River in Downey.

John Vincent of the Downey Historical Society said he feels sure Patton Road was named for the Patton family.

Critics claim Patton was perhaps a little crazy. Several biographers and the Oscar-winning movie made of his life note his alleged belief in reincarnation and his penchant for reminiscing over ancient battlefields in North Africa where he claimed he had fought in previous lives, centuries ago.

But if you need a military genius, you take him as you find him. Patton had grown up with a classical education including the tales of Hannibal and Alexander and Caesar. He knew five great-uncles and a grandfather, all of whom fought and were wounded or killed in the Civil War.

He personally had heard Rudyard Kipling talk of the thin red line of the British infantry, and he had personally listened to John Singleton Mosby, the Confederate Gray Ghost, talk tactics.

Patton was the fighting man's general. He hated the enemy, loved his men, and moved his Third Army to rescue U. S. Infantry pinned down at the Battle of the Bulge. In doing so he moved a modern army faster and farther than anyone ever before or since. And he successfully smashed Hitler's last major offensive.

The most singular aspect of Patton was that he won.

He was injured in an auto accident Dec. 9, in Mannheim, Germany, and died Dec. 21, 1945. He was buried there.

He often told friends he ached to be the commander of the last great battle in the last great war.

He really had no place or ease in peacetime.

And hopefully the resulting newspaper will be a quality one. Anything less and we have failed.







Ken's community awards include the Downey High School Hall of Fame 2005 and Kiwanis International HIXSON Service Award 2005.


Betty has been a resident of Downey for 36 years. She was appointed in 1990 to the Downey Unified School District's Board of Education and recently retired from that position after 15 years.



He has also served on the Hospital's Audit, Finance, Capital and Judicial committees.


"I became and stayed involved because I feel I can make a difference," Ron said. "The Hospital Administration and Board have the best motives with respect to the hospital.'





Keep your family safe this holiday season

The holiday season is upon us and it's time to pick out that beautiful Christmas tree. If you are choosing a live or an artificial tree, the Downey Fire Department would like to share a few helpful hints on keeping you and your family safe this holiday season.

A live tree should be as fresh as possible. There a few methods to test for freshness. Try grabbing a branch at the base of the tree. Pull slowly on the branch to check for loose needles. Or you can bend a few needles in half. If the needles break, choose another tree. Another method takes a little more muscle. Lift the tree and tap the trunk on the ground. If lots of needles fall to the ground, pick another tree. Don't leave the lot without having about two inches cut from the trunk. Get the tree in water as soon as possible. Water the tree every day.

Other reminders:

Choose the right kind of lights. Only use lights designed for indoor use inside and the same goes for outdoor lights. Don't mix different types of lights.

Get rid of lights with frayed, worn or broken cords. Check for loose bulb connections. If they are loose don't use them.

Connect no more than three light strands in a row for any one outlet. Use a power trip to keep circuits from overloading.

Make sure you use a sturdy stand that won't tip over. Very large or tall tree should be anchored to a wall.

If you purchase an artificial tree, be sure it is labeled as fire retardant.

Keep an eye on children and pets, too. Both are often fascinated with the lights and shiny decoration. A bad burn or choking incident could occur.

Keep tree and decorations away from heat sources. And never, ever use candles on your tree.

Don't store the dry tree next to the house or garage. Keep the tree off the curbside until your pick-up day.



The AKC's junior handler events are aimed at recognizing and supporting the special relationship between young people and dogs, encouraging responsible dog ownership and promoting dog show participation for future generations.

More than 3,400 dogs and adult handlers will compete for the top prize of \$50,000 and the title of National Champion. A conformation dog show, the event features competition among America's top 25 show dogs from every AKC-recognized breed.
